Biblical Apology:		
"Therefore if you are presenting your offering at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, <u>leave your offering there before the altar and qo; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and present your offering</u> . Make friends quickly with your opponent at law while you are with him on the way, so that your opponent may not hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the officer, and you be thrown into prison. Saying "I Was Wrong" in the Bible:

I. David Accepts Responsibility.

Nathan then said to David, "You are the man! Thus says the LORD God of Israel, 'It is I who anointed you king over Israel and it is I who delivered you from the hand of Saul. I also gave you your master's house and your master's wives into your care, and I gave you the house of Israel and Judah; and if that had been too little, I would have added to you many more things like these! Why have you despised the word of the LORD by doing evil in His sight? You have struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword, have taken his wife to be your wife, and have killed him with the sword of the sons of Ammon..."

II. Joseph's Brothers said, "We Were Wrong."

When Joseph's brothers saw that their father was dead, they said, "What if Joseph bears a grudge against us and pays us back in full for all the wrong which we did to him!" So they sent a message to Joseph, saying, "Your father charged before he died, saying, 'Thus you shall say to Joseph, "Please forgive, I beg you, the transgression of your brothers and their sin, for they did you wrong." And now, please forgive the transgression of the servants of the God of your father." And Joseph wept when they spoke to him. Then his brothers also came and fell down before him and said, "Behold, we are your servants." But Joseph said to them, "Do not be afraid, for am I in God's place? As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good in order to bring about this present result, to preserve many people alive." Genesis 50:15-20 (NASB)

Point: Loving others means accepting responsibility for your actions.

Loving others means saying, "I was wrong."

- 3. Making **RESTITUTION**. What can I do to **MAKE IT RIGHT?**
- 4. Genuinely **REPENTING**. I'll try not to do that **AGAIN**.
- 5. Requesting **FORGIVENESS**. Will you please **FORGIVE ME?**
