The Story of "Angels from the Realms of Glory"

- James Montgomery (1771-1854) was an Irish poet who grew up and lived in a time of disunity and conflict with England.
- Montgomery's parents were missionaries to the West Indies, and he was raised by the Moravian community.
- After flunking out of school and drifting, Montgomery's writing talent got him a job at the *Sheffield Register*.
- The paper often advocated for Irish freedom and after the owner was run out of town, Montgomery took over.
- Montgomery's editorial crusade against English rule and the institution of slavery landed him twice in prison.
- However, Christmas Eve 1816 marked a profound change when Montgomery published a poem called, "Nativity."
- "Nativity" began with angels flying over the earth to proclaim the birth of Jesus, which resulted in the shepherds' adoration, the sages' gifts, and the saints' praise in heaven.

The Fifth Stanza (Omitted from most hymnals)

"Sinners, wrung with true repentance, doomed for guilt to endless pains; Justice now repeals your sentence, mercy calls you—break your chains."

The Story Continued...

- Henry Smart (1813-1879) was an Englishman who left his law career and revolutionized music and thinking in the English church.
- Smart believed worship should be a joyful, corporate experience rather than passive and minimal as the traditionalists argued.
- Smart set Montgomery's "Nativity" to music and renamed it, "Angels From the Realms of Glory." This song opened the way for new and joyful musical styles in hundreds of English churches.
- Montgomery returned to the Moravian church and became a missionary like his parents. Collaborating with Smart, he composed more than 400 hymns that brought churches back to life.

"Angels..." is about Christian unity transcending all earthly divisions. It is only possible in a covenant relationship with God that is based on God's promises and lived out in human community.
